WIFE: (Stops stirring and looks at husband) A man!

HUSBAND: Come on, honey. It won't happen again. (Touches WIFE affectionately) So what's for dinner.

WIFE: (Tosses a piece of burned toast at him) Oops. I'm sorry. I forgot to save you some lasagna and then I made you some toast but forgot to turn off the toaster.

HUSBAND: (Looking at toast) Um, I said that I was sorry.

WIFE: And I'm sorry that you're sorry.

HUSBAND: Well, I'm sorry I made you sorry.

WIFE: If you weren't late again you wouldn't have to keep saying you're sorry.

HUSBAND: I'm sorry I keep saying "I'm sorry."

WIFE: (*Frustrated*) Then why do you keep saying "I'm sorry"?

HUSBAND: (Confused) I don't know!
