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CLARK enters. He stops at center, beside a table where DAVE sits. CLARK has a dollar in his hands and a confused expression.

**DAVE:** Can I help you with something?

**CLARK:** Didn't there used to be a Coke machine here?

**DAVE:** Yes.

**CLARK:** When did they get rid of it?

**DAVE:** Just this morning.

**CLARK:** Really? So where's a guy to go when he wants a Coke?

**DAVE:** Right here, sir.

**CLARK:** What?

**DAVE:** You want a Coke? I want to help you get a Coke.

**CLARK:** What are you, the Coke machine?

DAVE: Not at all, sir. I'm a self-contained, pre-packaged, carbonated beverage acquisi-

tion advisor.

**CLARK:** A what?

**DAVE:** (Hands CLARK a card) My card.

**CLARK:** Huh. I never heard of this. What's it mean?
