

THE LADDER by John Cosper

GENRE: Comedy

SYNOPSIS: A man whose neighbor is in desperate need of a ladder finds a hundred excuses not to offer him that ladder.

TIME: 5 minutes

CAST BREAKDOWN: 1M, 1F

THEME: Witnessing, Evangelism; Christian living; Neighbors

SCRIPTURE REFERENCE: Matthew 10:32-33

CHURCH YEAR SEASON: Any

SUGGESTED USE: Sermon Illustration, Evangelism training

CHARACTERS:

GEORGE and MILDRED—a married couple

PROPS: None required; a window, if desired

COSTUMES: Pajamas

SOUND: Two wireless microphones

LIGHTING: General stage

SETTING: A living room

DIRECTOR'S TIP: This should sound just like a conversation two people might have about religion and witnessing, not simply about a ladder. Make sure the actors commit to it with that level of seriousness. It will bring out the humor and, more importantly, the message.



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GEORGE is looking out a window, a concerned look on his face, as MILDRED enters.

MILDRED: George?

GEORGE: Morning, honey.

MILDRED: What are you staring at? Mrs. Honeycutt's not out in her swim suit again.

GEORGE: No, it's too cold for that.

MILDRED: Is that Harry?

GEORGE: Yup.

MILDRED: What's he doing?

GEORGE: Cleaning his gutters, I think.

MILDRED: What's he standing on?

GEORGE: I'm not sure. Looks like his garbage can.

There's a loud crashing sound off stage.

MILDRED: (In alarm) Oh!

GEORGE: Yep, definitely the garbage can.

MILDRED: He fell right through!

GEORGE: Those Rubbermaids aren't meant to support the weight of a full grown man. He should have filled it with something to give him more support.

MILDRED: You know what he needs, George. A ladder.

GEORGE: Yeah. That would do it.

MILDRED: Don't you have a ladder in the garage?

GEORGE: I think so.
