**GENRE:** Comedy/Light Drama

**SYNOPSIS:** Mandy, a nonbeliever, confronts a thief in her apartment who turns out to be Death. She struggles with the suddenness of death, the regrets of her life, and, finally, what lies beyond death.

proaches the very serious subjects of death and eternity with humor and sensitivity. You'd be doing the script—and your audience—a disservice to treat it too dramatically, but you'd also do them a disservice to treat it flippantly. The subject matter requires sensitivity. The authors have worked hard to include that in the script. and gloves.

**SOUND:** Wireless microphones

**LIGHTING:** General stage; dim lighting to suggest night

**SETTING:** Mandy's living room

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MANDY: Don't move!

DEATH is startled.

MANDY: I-I've got a gun!

**DEATH:** (Grabs his chest) You really shouldn't sneak up on people that way. You could

scare them half to . . . half to . . . well half to me!

MANDY: What? (Steps back) Are you drunk?

**DEATH:** No, but you could say I'm . . . dead to the world.

**MANDY:** You're some ... hopped up ... drug user person, aren't you! Well, I don't have any drugs here, except Pepto-Bismol, and that doesn't count. So leave or I'll... (Threatens with imaginary gun in pocket) I'll shoot! (Trying to sound brave) Do you feel lucky, punk?

**DEATH:** You don't have a gun, Mandy.

MANDY: Of course, I have a gun! A BIG gun! A 64 Magnum, like that cop Dirty Harvey.

And . . . hey, how do you know my name is Mandy? Which it isn't, but if it were . . . how would you know? Do I know you?

**DEATH:** Well you should. I'm quite famous. Everyone is DYING to know me. (Chuckles to himself and examines a knick-knack)

MANDY: What?

**DEATH:** I'm Death.

MANDY: You're dead? Am I having a Sixth Sense kind of experience?

**DEATH:** No . . . (Whispers) I see dead people.

MANDY: I don't understand! Are you some sort of ghost from my past? Are you Sam Roberts? Hey, look, that crash wasn't my fault. That same rule applies whenever you buy a used car from someone: "Let the buyer beware." I didn't know about the brakes, for sure. Like I'm supposed to check for every little thing before I sell a car. You should have taken it—

**DEATH:** I'm not Sam Roberts. Although he does send his regards and can't wait to get together with you. I said that my name is Death.

**MANDY:** Death?

**DEATH:** Death.
