CROSSING THE BRIDGE

GENRE: Comedy

SYNOPSIS: Two adults trying to decide if a small footbridge is safe to cross are amazed when a child comes along and skips across with-

out fear.

DIRECTOR'S TIP: The cast breakdown is described as one adult male and one adult female and a female child actress, but that's flexible depending on your drama team.

TIME: Under 5 minutes

CAST BREAKDOWN: 2M, 1F

THEME: Trust

SCRIPTURE REFERENCE: Matthew 14:22-33

CHURCH YEAR SEASON: Any

SUGGESTED USE: Sermon Starter

CHARACTERS:

John—very methodical, calculating Suzanne—nervous, jittery

Carly—a carefree, trusting 6-8 year-old

PROPS: Clipboard, pen, measuring tape, duffle bag, topographical maps, notebook, life jacket, bike helmet, box of Band-aids, other miscellaneous small instruments for JOHN

COSTUMES: Casual, modern dress

SOUND: Wireless microphones

LIGHTING: General stage

SETTING: A small bridge, like one used for landscaping, on the stage left side, with about 2/3 of the bridge visible and the very end behind

the curtain, where it can't be seen.

Drama Ministry

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JOHN: is checking out every square inch of the bridge, crawling underneath to look, checking it for wobbles, testing the tightness of screws, measuring the thickness of boards, etc.

He opens his duffle bag, pulls out a few topographical maps and a notebook, makes some notes on the notebook, talking to himself as he goes.

JOHN: Okay, 36 inches times the square root of 782, and let's see...barometer is 10, and the wind is...(*licks finger, holds it up*)...from the east. Now, the topographical map says we are 245 feet above sea level...OH! I'd better check the relative humidity under the south corner of this bridge....

He ducks under bridge, holding a small instrument; SUZANNE approaches and watches him.

SUZANNE: Ahhh... excuse me, what are you doing?

JOHN startles, bumps his head on the bridge.

JOHN: Ow.....Oh hello. I'm just testing the bridge, you know, to see if it's safe to cross.

SUZANNE: Why do you want to cross it? What's on the other side?

JOHN: I don't know, but I heard there's something good over there. I'm just weighing the risk factors.

SUZANNE: (peers over, trying to see what's on the other side, decides it definitely isn't worth it, shakes head) Nope. Too big of a risk, don't do it.

JOHN: Now, how do you know that? You've been standing here for, what, ten seconds?

SUZANNE: I can't see the other side. If I can't see it, I don't trust it. It's got to be right here in front of me or I don't trust it!

JOHN: Oh, come on, it all comes down to a matter of science. (*shows his notebook*) See this? According to my data, something really cool is going to happen if I cross this bridge. I've been up here all morning analyzing and calculating the risk to see if it's worth crossing the bridge or not.

SUZANNE: You've got to be kidding me! You've spent the entire morning analyzing that bridge? I could have told you hours ago that it's not safe. Look at it! You can't even see the other side! There's no way I'd cross it.

JOHN: Actually, my calculations come out okay, I just need a little extra equipment. (leans over to his duffle bag, begins to rifle through it)
