SYNOPSIS: Mandy feels adrift in the world with nothing to believe in. She longs for earlier times when reassurance was found in a simple childhood Bible.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES: It's important that Mandy be someone to whom the audience can relate. If she's at all whiny or if she comes off as morbidly depressed, the audience will dismiss her words as having nothing to do with them. So do your homework as director and have the actor playing Mandy do hers: Break the monologue into beats (as defined in the December issue) and determine Mandy's objectives.
