LORI and SUE enter from stage right. They are both in their late teens to early twenties. They both carry PDAs.

LORI: What time is it?

SUE: Almost seven.

LORI: Almost seven! We'd better get going. I think we need to be out the door by eight-thirty.

SUE: I don't think I'll make it.

LORI: You've got to! C'mon, Sue, it's been long enough. Look at us, we're practically old maids. We can't keep sitting around waiting for Mister Right to walk through the door. We need to take charge.

SUE: I know, I know.

LORI: We just can't wait any longer. We need to take control of this thing. Have you done your research? Do you know the kind of man you're looking for?

SUE: I think so.

LORI: Okay...shoot.

SUE: Well...I've researched all the appropriate magazines. You know, the ones with the experts: Vogue, Cosmo, Young Miss, Redbook, Ladies Home Journal, Ebony. I've studied the star charts, the weather patterns, the tides, the seasons and the Lumberjack Calendar. I think I've got it narrowed down. I'm looking for a man who is a cross between Albert Einstein and Chris Hemsworth.

LORI: Great! That's great. I'm looking for a George Bush-Orlando Bloom combo. Okay. What's your game plan?

SUE: Okay. Here goes. Oh-eight-thirty. Drive to church.
